Self-runing photo-sharer Snapchat was updated today with several major new features. You should take pictures before if you want to send any type of message through the service – now the text chat is available by swiping directly from the main camera view and then swiping again per person you want to talk to. As you might expect, message history is deleted when you swipe from a conversation, although you can choose to save individual messages for later if they matter. But text chat is just part of the new Snapchat. When both you and the person you're talking to have an open conversation, you'll see a blue notification button that you can instantly launch into a video call using the front or back camera. Of course, videos are just as fleeting as anything else Snapchat does, and video streams can be one-way or two-way. Both features represent a significant extension of the app's feature set, while maintaining the transient nature of Snapchat messages. If you walk around the city, there are plenty of people, vehicles and sounds that will distract both you and the person you are talking to. And if you're driving around, we probably don't need to tell you that it's dangerous to be behind the wheel when you talk on the phone, not to talk about when you're trying to position your phone for video chat and look at the person you're talking to. Do yourself (and everyone around you) a favor and try to stay in one place when you're on video chat. 3. Don't: Get distracted by taking a selfie in front of the fountain | Patrick Kovarik /AFP/Getty Images It doesn't matter if you're interviewing for a job or updating your college roommate about how your life is happening. If someone else is taking time out of their day to talk to you, make sure they don't disturb you when you come online to talk to them. Don't try to continue the conversation as you click through many of the tabs you've opened on your laptop, and don't reply to Facebook messages or check emails while a friend or family member on the other side of the call tells you a story. Remember that video chat is another way to try to connect with someone, so remind yourself that all the other tasks on your plate can wait. 4. Don't: Settle for Terrible Lighting Video Chat Demonstration | Kimihiro Hoshino/Getty Images No matter who you talk to, it's always a good idea to make sure the person on the other side of the video chat can really see your face. While you wouldn't video chat with someone when sitting in a pitch black room, you should probably also avoid extremely lighthearted situations (such as if you're sitting in front of a bright window with your face between your laptop and window). If you're worried about how you look, harsh industrial lighting is also something you might want to avoid. 5. Don't: Place the camera too close or at a strange angle Apple representative demonstrates video chat feature | Kimihiro Hoshino/Getty Images Whether it's a video chat on your phone, with an integrated laptop camera or a separate webcam, take a moment to make sure you're putting the camera where it should be. A common mistake is to place the camera too close to your face, which can be tacky and distracting for the person you're talking to. In addition, make sure that the camera is not set up too high or too low. In fact, you want to put it right around eye level and directly in front of you for the most flattering (and least distracting) angle. 6. Most line headsets will give you better results than relying on a microphone on a laptop, meaning you'll have a better chance of both sides getting clear audio without annoying background noise. 7. In fact, you should hide that box, if possible, so it doesn't interfere with you. While you may want to spend most of your video calling watching the person on the other side of the call, remember to look into the camera from time to time to allow the other person to make eye contact with them. 8. Dress professionally and make sure your clothes aren't wrinkled, even if you don't think they'll be visible in the video chat. And just to feel professional, try not to wear pajama pants along with your work shirt. Even if you're just talking to a friend, make sure you're actually dressed appropriately. Also make sure your hair is out of your face (and don't use the camera as a mirror to fix your hair) and try to refrain from touching your face. 9. Make sure your children are busy and your pets are safely locked in another room before you join the video call. Even if you think your children or pets are cute, chances are that whoever you're talking to wants to attend the task at hand or make up for what's been going on in your lives, and frequent interruptions make it difficult to achieve both of those goals. How to download Skype to your iPad The first step in using Skype on a new iPad is to download the free Skype app from the App Store so you go here: Sign in to the Skype app You must have a Skype account created to use the iPad app, so use either your Mac or PC or use Safari on your iPad and go here to create A Skype account. Once you've created your account, you're ready to sign in to Skype on your iPad. To do this, follow these steps: If you're not already in Skype, tap the Skype icon from the Start screen. Type your Skype name and password. Tap the Sign in button under the Password field. You should not re-enter this login information; is saved in Skype. The next time you tap Skype, it will automatically sign you in. Once you sign in to the Skype app, you want to start communicating with people. To do this, you'll need to find them and add them to your Skype contacts list: If you're not already in Skype, tap the Skype icon from the Start screen and sign in, if prompted. Tap the List key along the left margin. Tap one of the contact lists displayed, then tap the + icon at next, tap the Search Skype Directory, and type someone's name, email address, or Skype name. A touch search to locate that person. After you see the person you want to add, touch their name. Check the picture to make sure you have the right individual contact at the top to add a touch. Customize the invitation message accordingly. Tap the Send button to send an invitation to that person to become one of your Skype contacts. Repeat this procedure to add more contacts. Now you're ready to finally make that first Skype call on your iPad: If you're not already in Skype, tap the Skype icon from the Start screen and sign in, if you're asked. Tap the Lists button. Tap Contact Group to see your contacts. Tap the contact name you want to call Tap the Video Call or Voice Call button. Sometimes you don't want to show yourself so that calling only a voice can be helpful. You may see the Mobile button or another phone. Any other type of call requires you to pay for it with Skype credits. You can show the surroundings to the individual you're talking to on Skype by switching to the iPad's rear camera. Simply tap the camera key in the bottom row of icons and choose whether you want to display the front camera, rear camera, or no camera on the screen. If you choose No Camera, Skype will still work, but you'll just have a voice call without any video image. Tap a small picture of yourself (your contact picture) in the upper-left corner to access my Skype info. Tap this to see your recent Skype history. Skype keeps a history of your Skype IM discussions and call logs which is very useful for getting potentially important information. Skype calls are free. However, if you want to call people on their landline phones or mobile phones via Skype, you'll need to buy Skype credits or buy a monthly subscription plan. This can be done on the Skype website via safari or mac or PC. How to IM with Skype chat In addition to your phone, you can also chat via text with other Skype users from your iPad. Starting a chat is very similar to starting a call; Follow these steps to do this: If you're not already in Skype, tap the Skype icon from the Start screen and sign in if prompted. Tap the List icon along the left margin. Tap all contacts, iPad contacts, online contacts, Skype contacts, or any other list to see your contact groups. Tap the name of the contact you want IM with.
